I'm a teacher or school, how can I get Bucks Buzzing?



Pollinating insects need three things: food, water and shelter. All three of these can be provided on a school ground and used to help the students learn about the world around them. We've gathered some resources to help you, click on the ideas below to learn more:

Make a mini-meadow to attract butterflies and other insects.

Including a range of nectarrich flowering plants will help ensure there is food and shelter for insects all year.
